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# State of play of the Framework Convention on Tobacco Control Information from the Commission

The Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) covers the whole range of tobacco-control related activities. Altogether 151 countries have ratified the FCTC up to now (23 November 2007). Among these there are 25 Member States and the European Community.

#### The outcomes of the second Conference of Parties

The second Conference of the Parties of the FCTC took place from 30 June to 6 July 2007 in Bangkok. In the negotiations, the EU achieved its main objectives.

From the Commission's point of view main issues in the conference were:

- 1) adopt the guidelines on environmental tobacco smoke;
- 2) to start a process to negotiate a protocol on <u>illicit trade</u> in tobacco products, setting up an intergovernmental negotiating body (INB);
- 3) initiate work on guidelines on tobacco advertising, promotion and sponsorship;
- 4) initiate work on guidelines on packaging and labelling of tobacco products;
- 5) initiate work on guidelines on the implementation of the obligation of the Parties to act to protect their public health policies from commercial and other vested interests of the <u>tobacco</u> industry;
- 6) initiate work on guidelines on <u>education</u>, <u>communication</u>, <u>training and public awareness</u>;
- 7) continue the work on <u>contents and emissions of tobacco products and the related disclosure of</u> information;
- 8) establish terms of reference for the study group on <u>alternative crops</u>;
- 9) mandate the Secretariat to elaborate a first report on tobacco dependence and <u>cessation</u>;
- 10) agree on the <u>budget</u> and <u>programme of work</u>.

Satisfactory outcome was achieved in all above issues.

## **Follow-up to the Conference of Parties**

The new Bureau of the Conference of the Parties, elected at the closing session of the Conference in Bangkok, held its first meeting on 2 October in Geneva.

The Bureau decided, among other things, that the first session of the Intergovernmental Negotiating Body for the protocol on tobacco illicit trade will take place in Geneva from 11 to 16 February 2008.

The work of all the working groups has started or is already being planned as decided by the Conference of the Parties. The Commission is acting as a key facilitator in the group working on tobacco advertising, promotion and sponsorship, and in the group dealing with the regulation of the contents and disclosures of tobacco products. It is also partner in the groups working on packaging and labelling and the relations with the tobacco industry.

#### Authorisation from the Council to the Commission to negotiate

The authorisation given by the Council to the Commission in 1999 and 2001 covers the negotiation of the Convention itself and the related protocols. It also includes an annex providing negotiating directives. These negotiating directives were to be reviewed once the outline of the protocols became clear.

On 20 November 2007 the Commission adopted a recommendation to the Council on the addition of negotiating directives for a protocol on illicit trade in tobacco products and for a protocol on cross-border advertising, promotion and sponsorship.

## **RATIFICATION OF THE FCTC (Situation on 23 November 2007)**

The European Community signed on 16 June 2003, on the first possible occasion, and deposited its instrument of ratification on 30 June 2005.
