I. <u>INTRODUCTION</u>

On 7 June 2011, <u>the Commission</u> presented 27 Recommendations for a Council Recommendation based on Articles 121(2) and 148(4) TFEU. For the first time, the documents combine economic and employment recommendations with the draft Council opinions on Stability and Convergence Programmes. In addition, for the first time, the Recommendations for the Member States are presented in 27 different documents, instead of in a single text.

The Commission also submitted an overall Communication outlining its approach to the country-specific recommendations (doc. 11491/11) as well as, under Article 136 TFEU in combination with Article 121(2) TFEU, a separate set of recommendations for the economic policies of the countries whose currency is euro (doc. 11515/11).

The legal bases require the Council to consult the Employment Committee (EMCO) and the Economic and Financial Committee (EFC) before it decides on the country-specific recommendations. The EFC has delegated part of its work to the Economic Policy Committee (EPC). Certain parts of the recommendations fall under the competence of the Social Protection Committee (SPC), which has provided its input to the EMCO and EPC/EFC.

No consultation of the European Parliament is required, although Article 121(2) TFEU provides that the Council shall inform the European Parliament of the recommendations which it has adopted.

II. THE PROCESS - STATE OF PLAY

Taking into account the roles of the different Committees, EMCO, SPC, EPC and EFC have shared the preparatory work in order to submit the texts of the recommendations for a general approach to the EPSCO Council on 17 June (related to Article 148 TFEU) and subsequently to the ECOFIN Council on 20 June 2011.

The recommendations were examined by the EMCO on 9 and 10 June, including input from the SPC, and then jointly by EMCO and EPC on 14 June. The parts of the recommendations which do not deal with the employment aspects were further examined by the EPC. The EFC is considering the recommendations by written procedure, and on 17 June.

During these successive examinations the EMCO concentrated on the employment aspects falling under Article 148 TFEU and the EPC/EFC essentially on the broader macro- and micro-economic elements. While the recommendations are addressed to individual Member States, the Committees have considered certain issues in a horizontal manner, with the aim of ensuring the consistency of the recommendations across Member States. The work of the EPC is subject to the formal endorsement of the EFC.

The 27 separate texts of the recommendations (one document for each Member State), are to be found in the documents listed the Annex. They reflect the result of the examination by the EMCO (or where relevant by the joint EMCO/EPC examination).

On 15 June, the Permanent Representatives Committee (Part 1) discussed the employment-related parts of the recommendations. At this meeting, <u>Delegations</u> raised a number of horizontal issues:

- it was stressed that the recommendations would need to be clear and focused as well as coherent across countries on horizontal issues such as pensions and collective bargaining;
- it was also stressed that it was important that the recommendations, as well as the recitals, were exact and factual, reflecting the situation in the specific Member State;
- <u>the Commission</u> was requested to provide information on how the implementation of the recommendations would be followed-up, including clarification of the legal basis.

The open issues at the end of the meeting were as follows:¹

(i) <u>The Bulgarian delegation</u> requested to replace in Recommendation 3 on pensions (doc. 11413/11) the part in bold

"Implement the agreed steps with social partners under the current pension reform, advance some of its key measures to increase the effective retirement age and reduce early exit and strengthen measures to help older workers to stay longer in employment"

by:

"Implement the agreed steps with social partners under the current pension reform, advance some of its key measures that would help to increase the social insurance period through gradual increase of the social insurance length of service and strengthen policies to help older workers to stay longer in employment."

- (ii) The Czech delegation entered a reservation on recital nr. 11 in doc. 11414/11 which refers, in alia, to child-care issues; it requested the deletion of the wording "especially for children below the age of three",
- (iii) While an agreement on the recommendations for Spain was reached at the EMCO/EPC meeting, the place of recommendation 4 was left open (see doc. 11421/11). The Spanish delegation considered that it should be either integrated in recommendation 1 or immediately after that recommendation;
- (iv) <u>The Cypriot delegation</u> entered reservations on the three employment-related recommendation, i.e. recommendations 3, 4 and 5 (doc. 11424/11);

In the order the countries are listed in the Annex.

- (v) The Lithuanian delegation agreed in general with the draft Recommendations addressed to it but considered that recommendations 2 and 3 should not mention specific legislative acts (doc.11426/11);
- (vi) The Maltese delegation considered that Recommendation nr. 4 on reforming the automatic wage indexation mechanism should be deleted. This recommendation nr. 4 was discussed jointly by the EMCO and EPC. <u>Malta</u> maintained a reservation on this recommendation (see doc. 11432/11);
- (vii) The Polish delegation reiterated its factual request to modify to recital 11 in document 11435/11. The last sentence of recital 11

"........ Moreover, the heavily subsidised farmers' social security fund (KRUS) distorts incentives for farmers to move to more productive sectors, which is also affected by education, infrastructure and mobility challenges, slowing economic restructuring and hampering productivity growth".

should be replaced by the following:

"...... Moreover, the **very** heavily subsidised farmers' social security fund (KRUS) **provides little** incentives for farmers to **leave the sector**, slowing economic restructuring and hampering productivity growth, which is also affected by education, infrastructure and mobility challenges **in rural areas**".

(viii) <u>The Portuguese delegation</u> noted that the title of document 11436/11 should be corrected, as Portugal does not have a Stability Programme.

<u>The Commission Representative</u> entered a global reservation on the above amendments to the draft Recommendations.

In addition, <u>the Belgian delegation</u> entered a reservation on recommendation 2 ("...increase the effective retirement age, and linking the statutory retirement age to life expectancy"), stressing that the issue of that recommendation was also related to employment. However, EMCO has not included it in its opinion in doc. 11412/11.

<u>The Greek delegation</u> requested a factual amendment (depending on the clarification of a question of legal nature) to recital 7 in document 11420/11, which is under discussion by the EFC.

<u>The Chair of the Committee</u> requested the relevant delegations and the Commission to continue discussions with a view to solve any open issues bilaterally before the Council meeting.

III. CONCLUSION

The <u>Council (EPSCO)</u> is invited to examine the remaining open issues in the employment specific parts of the recommendations, with a view to reaching a <u>general approach</u> on the 27 documents of draft Recommendations (employment-related aspects).

On 20 June, the <u>ECOFIN Council</u> will consider the country-specific recommendations, on the basis of the preparation by the Economic Policy Committee and the Economic and Financial Committee.

The final documents of the country-specific Recommendations will be submitted to <u>the European Council</u> on 23-24 June 2011.
